Types of phrasal verbs



- Verb + preposition
 - (on, in, at, for, into, from, to, by, of, about, with, after, across)
- Verb + adverb
 - (up, down, away, out, back, through, off)
- Verb + preposition + adverb





Phrasal verbs - how they are shown in the dictionary:

- check in
- put **sth** on
- beat **sb** up
- take after **sb**
- warm (**sb/sth**) up
- put **sth** down to **sth**

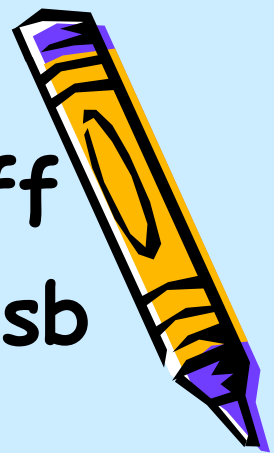

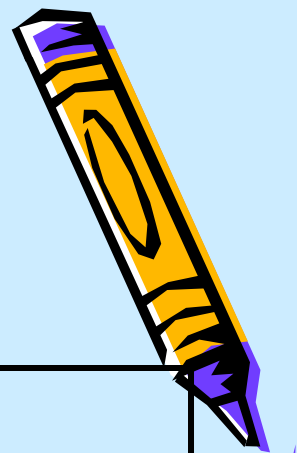

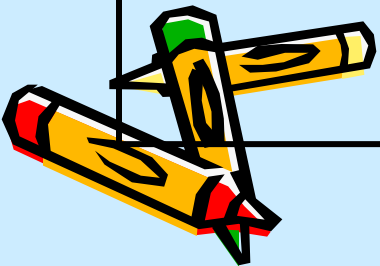
